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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Apopka MS serves 909 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 51% Hispanic and 49% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 66% White, 28% Black, 0% Native, 2% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Lisa James and Assistant Principal Hollie Pearce.. Apopka MS is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books, BETA Club, and orchestra/band.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Apopka MS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2000 and the number of books per student is 19. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Apopka MS does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Eighth grade students in this school improved significantly on the math state assessment (FAST).
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.
- The average year of publication for nonfiction books is 2005 which needs to be improved.
- New book purchases will focus on nonfiction titles
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Cataloging Project as well as aged titles in nonfiction.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.










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

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Apopka MS in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Analysis

• Hispanic students are 51% of the school's population. Only 4.2% of the titles in our collection represent this group. Only 4.9% of titles represent the 28% of our student population that is Black.

Titles need to be ordered focusing on this need.
